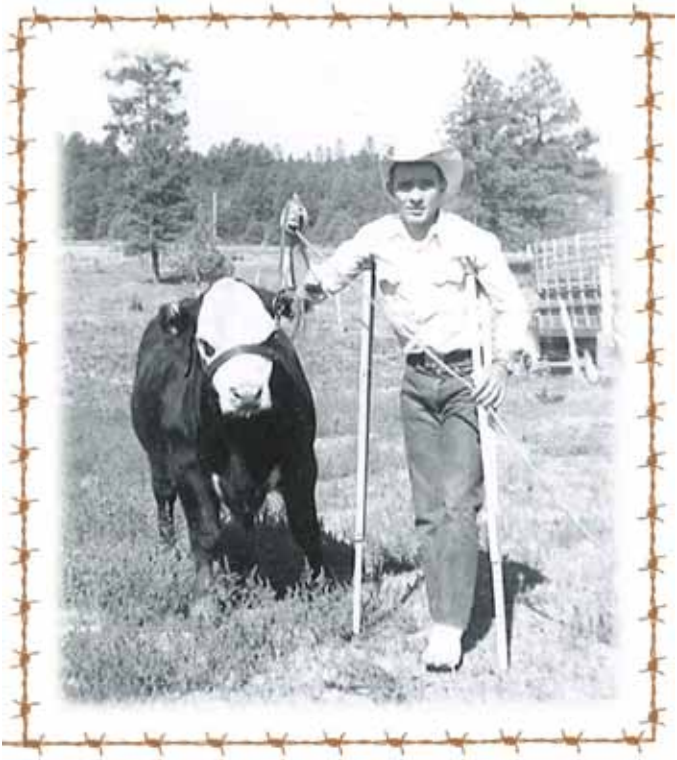

Western Heritage Ranch Rodeo

Count on family fun at the Western Heritage Ranch Rodeo on Saturday, August 6th beginning at Noon. If you have never attended a Ranch Rodeo then you are in for a real treat. Ranch Rodeo is an event that was re-created a number of years ago to return to the roots of rodeo when the first event was established in 1882. The event widely hailed as the first rodeo was held in North Platte, Nebraska and was produced by William F. Cody (Buffalo Bill). Buffalo Bill incorporated trick riding and a number of other entertaining additions to the rodeo.

The competition was about the ranches and who could be awarded the prize of being the best ranch in the rodeo. Ranch-vs-Ranch contests gradually sprang up, and events were created that simulated what the ranch cowboys did for work each day on the ranch. These rodeos were a gathering of ranch families and became a social function that was not only a competition but a time of visiting with each other and sharing their lives. As time went on rodeo evolved and became a showcase of each individual cowboy rather than the team concept or ranch-versus ranch competitions that were originally held. Modern day Ranch Rodeo is a return to those times of sharing and friendly competition

In today's fast paced environment it is rare that one can go to a sporting event of any kind and see and feel the camaraderie and the friendliness that we feel at ranch rodeo. So come on down to the Archuleta County Fair and watch ranch cowboys and cowgirls compete in horse catching, calf branding, team penning, team doctoring and wild cow milking. Admission to watch the rodeo is included in your gate entry.

Exhibitor Rules and Regulations

HOW TO ENTER - Read the Open Class Rules and Regulations. Look at the Table of Contents and find the department for the item you want to exhibit. Read the instructions, pre-registration information and early entry deadlines. Choose your best and bring it out to the County Fairgrounds!

WHEN TO ENTER - Wednesday, August 3rd from 1:00 to 8:00 pm. Once you enter on August 3rd, bring your perishable entries Thursday, August 4th from 7:30 - 9:00 am. ALL OTHER ENTRIES are to be left with the superintendent on Wednesday.

WHERE TO GO - Fairgrounds, CSU Extension Building located at 344 Highway 84, Pagosa Springs, CO.

JUDGING WILL BE - Thursday, August 4th, 2011.

Homemaker of the Year Award

Age categories: Adult (20+) and Teen (13-19)

This \$25.00 cash award and title is presented to the exhibitor of each category with the highest points in at least 4 of the following departments: Beer & Wine, Sewing, Needlework, Table Setting, Crafts, Woodworking, Baked Goods, Home Furnishings, Fine Arts, Photography, Floriculture, Fruits & Vegetables and Preserved Foods. Points are awarded as follows: 1st = 4 points; 2nd = 3 points; 3rd = 1 point.

Open Class Rules and Regulations

When it comes to exhibits, the Archuleta County Fair offers a variety of displays to look at and the work of artists of all kinds to admire. Consider entering your projects at the fair. If you can knit, crochet, paint, draw, sew, bake, brew, preserve, photograph, build or grow things...then you are a candidate! There is always room for more entries. Your project doesn't have to be anything too complicated. It's best to enter the work you've been doing throughout the year. So come on - show off your talents - prepare and enter your items!

Here are the ground rules for exhibiting:

1. Quilting registration and judging will be on Saturday, July 31st. Entries are accepted from 8:00 am to 12 Noon and judging will begin at 1:00 pm.

2. Registration (check in) of ALL open class items to be judged in the Exhibit Hall must be on Wednesday, August 3rd, from 1:00 – 8:00 pm. Due to freshness, Baked Goods, Fruits, Vegetables, Floriculture and Field Crops MUST register their entries on Wednesday, but may physically bring their entries in on Thursday, August 4th between 7:30 – 9:00 am. We will rigorously adhere to registration times.
3. Divisions outlined in the handbook are open to individuals from both inside and outside of Archuleta County. Articles must be entered in the name of the person who made it.
4. All open class entries must have been completed or raised since the previous year's Archuleta County Fair.
5. Unless otherwise noted the AGE breakdown is as follows: Youth = 12 & Under, Teen = 13 -19, Adult = 20 & over. For 4-H Members, competition age is how old you were on December 31st, 2010.
6. Each exhibitor may enter a maximum of ten (10) entries per department unless otherwise noted. In order to increase Preserved Foods entries, there is no maximum entry restriction.
7. Each exhibitor may enter two (2) items per class; however, only one (1) per class will be judged, other item will be marked "Exhibit Only".
8. The "other" class in each department includes exhibits that do not fit into any other class. At the discretion of the superintendent and/or judge, a class may be added if entries warrant.
9. Superintendents cannot compete in the department they superintend.
10. First, second, third, and/or fourth place ribbons will not necessarily be awarded in each class. Judges will not award ribbons to an unworthy exhibit. An exhibit will be determined unworthy at the judge's sole discretion. In each case, the decision of the judge is final. If the exhibitor does not understand the placing, they may speak to the department superintendent.
11. Classes in the Beer, Wine & Spirits division have been updated. By following these beer style guidelines, the Fair has qualified to be a BJCP Sanctioned Competition, which will allow any winners to further their home-brewing credentials on the national level.
12. 4-H Divisions outlined in the handbook are open only to individuals enrolled as 4-H members in Archuleta County and each exhibit must represent a project in which the member is officially enrolled. Entries cannot be cross-entered in Open and 4-H Classes.
13. All animals in Open and 4-H Classes must be received at designated times on Thursday, August 4th.
14. The Extension Building will be closed except to superintendents and judges on Thursday, August 5th until 5:00pm. NO EXCEPTIONS.
15. The Exhibit Hall is open for viewing on Friday & Saturday 9:00 am – 9:00 pm, and Sunday 9:00 am – 4:00 pm.
16. Exhibited items must remain on display for the benefit of all to

see for the duration of the fair. Entries will be displayed until 4:00 pm, Sunday August 7th, and must be released by the Superintendent. Any exhibitor who removes an entry prior to 4:00 pm, Sunday, will forfeit all premiums and ribbons and will be excluded from exhibiting in the following year's fair.

17. All exhibits must be removed from the Fairgrounds by 6:00 pm, August 7th. The Fair Board is not responsible for loss or damage. Exhibits not picked up will be held at the CSU Extension Building for no longer than 10 days after the fair and then will be discarded. Exhibitors may be asked to sign a release of liability.
18. Exceptions to above rules: Exhibitors are responsible for checking exceptions under individual division heading or as posted in the Extension Building.

The Archuleta County Fair Board is not responsible for accidents of any nature, but every precaution will be taken for the safety of the public and exhibitors. The Fair Board asks the public to observe all reasonable safety rules. The right is reserved by the Fair Board to interpret, revise and add to the rules governing the Fair as its interest may require.

Any protest must be in writing, accompanied by a deposit of \$50.00 cash or certified check and filed with the Fair Board within 12 hours of the alleged violation. Deposits will be returned only if protest is sustained. All protests will be considered and acted upon by an executive committee of the Fair Board members. This committee will have the absolute right to make a final interpretation of rules and regulations and settle all differences in regard to or arising from the Archuleta County Fair. Visitors should report to the Extension Office any mistreatment or extortion practiced by an employee, volunteer or concessionaire of the Fair.

BAKED GOODS AND MORE

Superintendents: Jeanie Lemmo & Cher Logsdon

AGE CATEGORIES:

- Youth: 5 – 12 years old
- Amateur Teen: 13 – 19 years old
- Professional Teen: 13 – 19 years old who derives more than \$250 income from the sale of baked goods.
- Amateur Adult: 20 years and older
- Professional Adult: 20 years and older who derives more than \$250 income from the sale of baked goods.

Special Instructions

1. Any item may be tested to the satisfaction of the judge. No item which would be unsafe to eat at time of judging or which needs refrigeration will be accepted.
2. All exhibits should be brought on sturdy disposable plates and covered with transparent wrap. Only a portion of the exhibit may be kept for display. Entrants are encouraged to submit a recipe card for their entries.
3. Pies must be exhibited in disposable pie plates.

4. Exhibitors must enter whole or entire cake or pie. Breads are to be in loaves unless otherwise specified.

5. The Judge will consider entries on a basis of General Appearance, Color, Crust or Outer Covering, Shape & Volume, Texture, Crumb (moist or dry), Consistency, Tenderness, and Flavor.

CLASS

Yeast Bread - should have a uniform golden crust, a smooth, well-rounded top, slice easily, and hold shape. Texture should be moderately fine, even grained, free from large air bubbles and well-baked. The flavor should be pleasant, with a bland nut-like taste. Allow bread to cool before covering.

2. 100% Whole Wheat Bread, Loaf
3. Whole Wheat and White (Mixed), Loaf
4. Fancy Rolls (6)
5. Dinner Rolls (6)
6. Doughnuts (6)
7. French Bread, Loaf

10. Batter Bread
11. Coffee Cake
12. Bread Machine Plus
13. Holiday Breads (label variety)
14. Any Other Yeast/Sourdough Bread

Quick Bread - should be even or slightly rounded, golden brown crust, equally light throughout. Texture should have a fine even grain, not crumbly. Flavor should be characteristic of ingredients. Any nuts or fruit should be uniformly distributed. No quick bread mixes.

15. Biscuits (6)
16. Muffins (6)
17. Banana (with and without nuts) Bread
18. Nut Bread (no fruit or vegetables)
19. Zucchini Bread
20. Fruit Bread
21. Coffee Cake, Quick Bread (no yeast)
22. Any Other Quick Bread

Homemade Cakes - should have a neat appearance. Texture should be consistent with recipe and ingredients used with flavor well-blended and pleasant taste.

23. Angel Food
24. Chiffon
25. Chocolate
26. White
27. Yellow
28. Fruit (Banana, Raw Apple, Carrot, etc.)
29. Pound Cake
30. Any Other Cake

Cookies - 6 pieces per plate. Cookies should be of an even thick-

ness. All cookies should be free of excess flour on the outside and delicately browned unless recipe states otherwise.

- Drop Cookies – Dough is dropped by spoon onto cookie sheet, not flattened.
- Molded Cookies – Dough is rolled into balls or thin pencil shaped rolls between hands. Some cookies are then flattened with the bottom of a glass, or criss-crossed with the tines of a fork, or pressed down with a thumb, or pressed into a cookie mold for shaping, or stamped.

Livestock Project Requirements and Instructions: Entries will follow the guidelines and requirements set forth in the 2010-2011 Livestock Rules and Regulations which is available at the CSU Extension Office.

1. All paperwork, entry forms and misc. items must be picked up during Fair Promotion Day (which all are expected to attend) at the CSU Extension Office and must accompany each animal during weigh-in. All paperwork must be filled out prior to weigh-in.
2. Archuleta County Fair will make every effort possible to ensure that livestock entered are healthy. A licensed veterinarian and/or livestock superintendent will carefully examine all livestock. Any animal that shows any evidence of an infectious or contagious disease and/or injury (open or non-healed wound) may be removed from the fairgrounds or held in quarantine and treated at the owner's expense. Animals deemed unworthy of competition by the Livestock Superintendent may be barred from competition and removed from the fairgrounds. The Archuleta County Fair does not accept responsibility for undiscovered diseased animals and does not warrant its health inspections.
3. Removal of animals from the fairgrounds prior to release time will result in loss of premiums for open-class animals. No Fair premiums will be paid in market livestock classes.
4. All animals (Open Class and 4-H) must be cleared and/or dismissed by the Livestock Superintendent including the animals loaded on the truck headed for the processing plant. This is the only way to know for sure that the right animals go to the correct destinations.
5. Animals that require being lead during a show must be lead across the scale at weigh-in and in the fairgrounds area. If you are not able to do so with your animal, the animal may be excused (by a superintendent) from the fair.
6. Exhibitors of livestock must exercise due discretion in regard to the animals they are exhibiting, whether in the ring, stall or pen and must assume all responsibility for any damage caused by or to their animals. They, meaning the exhibitor, must exhibit and parade their animals in the ring provided for that purpose at the discretion of the Livestock Superintendent. Each 4-H member will be judged by the appropriate project standards of good showmanship.
7. Superintendent or his assistants will assign stall space within the barns. Any exhibitors not abiding by the stall assignments will be considered not a member in good standing. Stalls and pens must be neatly kept and supplied with clean bedding. Wood shavings will be provided and deducted from your check after the sale. Each animal (market, breeding, etc.) weighed in will be charged a bedding fee. All non-market animals must pay for wood shavings upon arrival at weigh in. Monies need to be given to the Livestock Superintendent.
8. In market classes, the class divisions and the number of animals in each class will be determined by the Superintendents after the animals are weighed and/or measured. There will be no weigh backs. Animals will be weighed only once at appropriate time.
9. Beef, Swine, Lamb and Goat must be in place Thursday, August 4th at 9:00 am, Rabbit and Poultry must be in place by 10:00am.
10. Only two animals of any particular species may be shown by each member in any market class.
11. Only animals which have been awarded first premiums will be permitted to compete for Grand Champion. The remaining first premium winners and the second premium winners in the class

- from which the Grand Champion was selected may compete for Reserve Champion.
12. Members are limited to the sale of two market animals of different species. Exception: All Grand Champion and Reserve Champion animals will be sold at auction.
 13. There will be no market livestock or any other animal (including rabbit and poultry) sold on the grounds during the Fair until after the Junior Livestock Sale. No signs for selling of market or any animals may be posted until after the Junior Livestock Sale. This is an unethical practice and may result in a 4-H member losing their status of good standing for one year.
 14. Only 4-H members enrolled in Archuleta County 4-H and residing in Archuleta, Hinsdale or Mineral Counties south of the Continental Divide that are in good standing may consign animals to the sale.
 15. 4-H members may show animals in both market and open class. 4-H members must show their own animals, unless there are two in the same class. Then, only Archuleta County 4-H members in good standing can show in their place.
 16. It is the exhibitor's responsibility to be at the proper place and time for entry, weigh-in, and exhibit shows.
 17. Each exhibitor is required to help tear down the Livestock Tent and WHEC Building on Sunday, August 7th, 2011. See 4-H Schedule of Events for exact times.
 18. The following includes project completion requirements:
 - a. Club attendance/activities as required by club and/or county;
 - b. Attend Mandatory Livestock Meeting;
 - c. Attend record book interview, exhibit project at County Fair, and submit a completed record book appropriate to age;
 - Record book completion will be divided into 3 divisions: Junior: 8-10 years; Intermediate: 11-13 years; and Senior: 14 years and older as of December 31st, 2010.
 - Each 4-H member will have a personal interview with a judge. Individuals will be judged on knowledge of project appropriate for their age, experience, clarity of responses, poise and appearance (appropriate attire, neatness). The interview is limited to the judge and the 4-H member. Date and times of interviews will be pre-scheduled and posted.
 - Record books will be submitted during the interview. Books will be returned to the 4-H member on Thursday, August 4th. Final submission for official judging will be by Friday, August 12th by 4:00pm. Record books will be judged on the basis of completeness, accuracy, and neatness.
 - If an animal does not make weight or dies, a completed record book must be turned in and interview must be attended.
 - d. Completion of Meat Quality Assurance program as required by the State 4-H Program;
 - e. Additional requirements as may be set by the county.
 19. If a 4-H member does not meet project requirements (club requirements, interview, record book, etc.) they will not be able to participate in that project (species) the next 4-H year. These members will also not be eligible for any awards (achievement or otherwise). 4-H Members must be in good standing both in their conduct and financial responsibilities in order to show and/or sell their 4-H project animal at the County Fair.
 20. Any protest alleging unethical practices must be made in writing within 12 hours after the alleged violation and must be accompanied by a deposit of \$50 cash/certified check. The sum will be forfeited if protest is not sustained. The verdict of a qualified and practicing veterinarian and two disinterested livestock persons appointed by the Archuleta County Fair Board, to act as a board of arbitration in case of protests pertaining to the foregoing rule, will be considered

- final. Neither the member of this appointed board or the Archuleta County Fair Board or Junior Livestock Committee will be held liable in case of any decision/penalty invoked pertaining to the above rule.
21. The Archuleta County Fair Board is not responsible for accidents of any nature, but every precaution will be taken for the safety of the public and exhibitors. The Fair Board asks the public to observe all reasonable safety rules. The right is reserved by the Fair Board to interpret, revise and add to the rules governing the Fair as its interest may require.

Special Instructions

1. Entries begin Thursday, August 4th at 8:30 am. All animals must be in place by 10:00am, no exceptions.
 - a. 4-H Rabbit & Cavies - Judging is Friday, August 5th at 8:30 am and is open to the public.
 - b. 4-H Market Rabbit - Show is Friday, August 5th at 10:30am.
 - c. 4-H Market Turkey Showmanship is Friday, August 5th at 2:30pm in the Livestock Tent.
2. Cages available. Food and water containers and care provided by Exhibitors. Animals must have feed and non-spill water cups that clip onto the cages. Exhibitors are responsible for and must feed and water their animal entries each day by 9:00am and again by 5:00pm.
3. *NEW* Sunday, August 7th, 7:00am-7:30am: All animals MUST be fed and watered. All Animals and personal belongings must be out of the WHEC Building by 9:00am. All exhibitors will be responsible for setting up/tearing down cages before and after the fair.
4. All breeds of rabbits recognized by the American Rabbit Breeders Association will be judged according to the Standard of Perfection. Rabbits must be permanently earmarked in the left ear before judging starts. Rabbit Exhibitors are responsible for carrying their rabbits to/from the judging table. If the 4-H member is unable to do so, make arrangements with the superintendent. Small animals will be judged on their appearance, weight, coat, adherence to standard presentation, ease of handling, health care, and overall condition. Any animal showing signs or symptoms of any disease may be disqualified by department officials.
5. All Chickens will be entered by class and variety by the Superintendent on Thursday, August 4th depending upon number and type of entries
6. Trio = 2 females & 1 male or 3 females
7. All rules and regulations are found in the Livestock Rules and Regulations which is available at the CSU Extension Office.
